

Dear friends and supporters

We've had a really active period of fundraising as many more people become aware of the value of vision research. This is an incredibly exciting time for all of us who are working to improve visual outcomes for patients who have been diagnosed with blinding eye diseases. Thank you to those of you who supported my Cambridge Half Marathon and, of course, for all your donations and regular gifts. Between us we have raised over £5m for vision research through Gift of Sight over the last twenty years.



A large proportion of this can be attributed to generous legacy gifts but the rest has been raised through sheer hard work and amazing fundraising events set up by patients and their families. Recent examples include an 80 year old supporter who climbed Scafell Pike in Cumbria to celebrate his birthday, a visually impaired patient walking the full length of Croatian Long Distance Trail and the father of a child with albinism, who is preparing to run 7 marathons in 7 days in September. I'm delighted to hear that some of our research team, together with our Gift of Sight assistant Jennie, are planning to undertake the Three Peaks Challenge, also in September. It looks like a busy month!

I have written an article overleaf to show how much our research is helping move towards treatments for both wet and dry forms of age-related macular degeneration (AMD). Gift of Sight has been instrumental in supporting salaries to push our research forward, as well as purchasing consumables, imaging equipment and kit for the laboratories. I was also involved in a study relating to home testing for wet AMD. This showed that none of the home-monitoring vision tests evaluated were helpful in detecting relapse or new signs of wet AMD. In other work, we are currently participating in clinical trials of new gene therapy treatments for both the dry and wet forms of AMD. If these trials are successful we might only have to treat a patient once, as opposed to the sometimes hundreds of injections patients might otherwise need! We are very grateful to all the patients who help us with this work, many of whom also support the Gift of Sight Appeal.

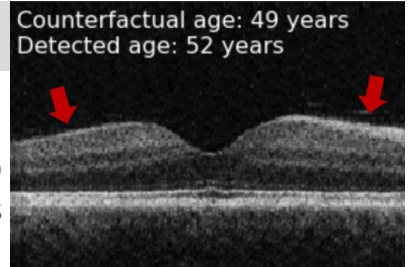
My team and I really do value your enormous support and look forward to catching up with many of you at our events. Thank you again for your tremendous interest and generosity.

Professor Andrew Lotery: Age related Macular Degeneration (AMD)



In 2018 I led a collaboration of researchers who were awarded a £4 million grant from the Wellcome Trust entitled “Deciphering AMD by deep phenotyping and machine learning: the PINNACLE study”. This study was developed with the aims of better understanding the processes behind the progression of Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) and identifying the individual risk factors that contribute to this. AMD is a very common cause of blindness but, unfortunately, we don’t know who will progress to the sight threatening stage of the disease. Some patients progress slowly or not at all and others quickly.

I am leading this study, working with colleagues in the UK, Europe and the USA. By teaching computers to analyse over 500,000 high resolution images of the inside of the eye, we can identify any changes that appear in the eyes of patients with AMD. We have proved that computers can reliably predict how an eye changes in structure as it ages and we can now see which layers of the retina (the tissue that senses light in the back of the eye) thin first. This should help us develop new types of early treatments and enter the most appropriate patients into clinical trials.

As part of this study we are currently training computers to give an accurate verbal description of what a retinal image shows and hope this might ultimately help high street opticians identify which patients need urgent referral to hospital for their AMD. This will ensure that patients are directed to the right hospital clinic, which currently does not happen in around four out of five cases!

We are also investigating how AMD progresses by carefully following up 400 patients with early AMD and checking how each layer of the eye changes over time. This should help us identify which patients are at high risk of needing treatment. I am really grateful to them for helping us with this work.

This is the largest grant that has been awarded to the Vision Group in Southampton to date and the application was built on our many years of research into AMD. One of the conditions of the grant was that we made a financial contribution to the research. Gift of Sight made this possible by contributing over £100,000 towards a retinal camera that we needed for this project. I think this really highlights the benefit of the Gift of Sight appeal. Thanks to this funding we were able to access £4 million of funds for research, which is a 40-fold return on the investment!

Natalie Clarke : PINNACLE Trial Manager

I joined the PINNACLE team in October 2022, following eight years working on oncology clinical trials for the University of Southampton.

It is my responsibility, as Trial Manager, to oversee and coordinate all study activity, whilst also making sure everything runs smoothly and within the project timelines. A large part of my role involves liaising with our 12 study sites and 6 collaborating institutions across the UK and Europe, in order to check progress and resolve any queries. I also maintain the central visit records of our 429 intermediate AMD patients, who attend their local study site every four months to undergo specialised testing and imaging of their eyes. The purpose of these visits is to identify and monitor any early structural changes, which we hope will give us more information about how and why AMD develops over time.



My other responsibilities can include anything from managing study finances, creating internal study newsletters, to updating study documents and writing protocols for ethics board review.

Most recently I have also been responsible for setting up our 'SUMMIT' extension project; an additional 2-year follow-up period which will provide further valuable insights into the mechanisms of AMD progression. My favourite part of the role is being able to work closely with our study site teams and ensure we are conducting our research to the highest possible standard. It's also very rewarding to hear that our participants really appreciate being part of the trial, and even enjoy attending their study visits!

This is all only possible with the hard work of our study teams, the dedication of our participants, and the support we receive from our funders, including the Gift of Sight Appeal. I look forward to seeing how the results of both PINNACLE and SUMMIT will help to shape the way AMD is diagnosed, monitored, and treated in the future.

Portswood Knitwits Charity Fundraising, Portswood Library

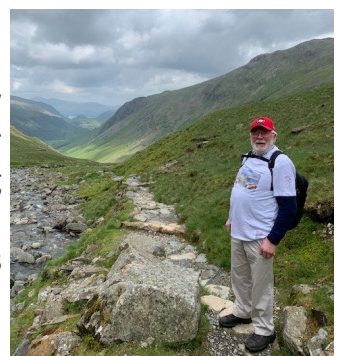
